

Val McDermid is a number one bestseller whose novels have sold over nineteen million copies worldwide. She has won many awards including the CWA Gold Dagger for best crime novel of the year and the LA Times Book of the Year Award.

Val comes from Kirkcaldy, Fife, and read English at St Hilda's College, Oxford. She was the first ever student from a state school in Scotland. Her first success as a novelist came with *Report for Murder*, first published in 1987.

Val will be talking about her life in writing, the Karen Pirie books series, and the publication, earlier this year, of *Queen Macbeth*, a retelling of the life of that most intriguing and complex of Shakespearian characters.

Cornwall is the perfect setting for tales, myths, and legends, providing a perfect backdrop to ghostly goings-on.

Join Keith Wallis host of 'The Piskie Trap' – a podcast exploring the folklore, history and legends of Cornwall – as he talks to some of the authors who have contributed to the recently published book 13 Cornish Ghost Stories.

Emily Barr is a travel writer and novelist, the author of YA books and bestselling thrillers. Liz Fenwick has published nine novels and two novellas taking her inspiration from Cornwall's history and landscape. Emma Cowell is a former actress and broadcaster turned novelist. They will be joined by co-editor of the collection Marie Macneill, writer, director, playwright and Senior Lecturer at the School of Film and Television at Falmouth University.

Together they will be discussing their literary inspirations, the inherent ghostliness of Cornwall and the rich folkloric past that some of the stories in the collection draw upon.

### David Baddiel My Family

On the surface, David Baddiel's childhood was fairly standard: a lower-middle-class Jewish family living in an ordinary house in north-west London. But David came to realise that his mother was not ordinary at all. Having fled Nazi Germany to escape extermination as a child, she was desperate to make her life count, which took the form of a passionate, decades-long affair with a golfing memorabilia salesman.

In *My Family* David's account - featuring a hilarious description of how his mother turned their house over to golfing nicknacks, and an eyepopping cache of her erotic writings - reveals Sarah Baddiel as a cross between Jack Niklaus and Erica Jong.


Meanwhile, as Baddiel investigates his family's past, his father's memories are fading; dementia is making him moodier and more disinhibited, with an even greater penchant for obscenity. But there is both comedy and poignancy to be found: laughter is a constant presence, capable of transforming the darkest of experiences into something redemptive.

Rick Stein's Food Stories also shines a spotlight on talented food heroes from all over the country, from food growers and producers to immigrant home cooks and rebellious young chefs.

### Petroc Trelawny: Trelawny's Cornwall

It would be hard to think of a more Cornish name than Petroc Trelawny, combining, as it does, Cornwall's celebrated saint with the name of its unofficial national anthem. But when a stranger challenges the Radio 3 presenter on his ancestry, he is inspired to return to the place where he grew up and attempt to confirm if he still belongs there.

Returning to his childhood home on the Lizard, he visits mine workings, ancient churches, and places where poets, architects and filmmakers have worked to shape Cornwall's identity. He holds a finger up to winds of change, exploring the collapse of Methodism, the decline of the Cornish language, and the complex question of tourism.

As he travels around, he conjures vivid figures and scenes from memory, telling the stories of a loving family full of mysteries and a landscape still redolent of 'Cornish otherness'.

In a community in which women's voices are often silenced and violence against them is overlooked time after time, the group soon find themselves compelled to speak out — and to act. But even they could never have foreseen the consequences of their courage...



Cathy Rentzenbrink is the author of the highly acclaimed novel *Everyone is Still Alive* and several works of non-fiction including the Sunday Times bestselling memoir *The Last Act of Love*.

Cathy will be talking about her new novel, *Ordinary Time*, which charts the joys and sorrows of everyday life and asks big questions about friendship and marriage, forgiveness and redemption, and the real meaning of love.

It tells the story of Ann, a reluctant Vicar's wife whose husband only has eyes for God, while her son is asking questions she struggles to answer. When her brother needs help, Ann travels from Cornwall up to London where a chance meeting opens up a new world of possibilities. Ann knows what the congregation would say, but once she has been led into temptation, it may prove impossible to resist.

### Helen Scales: The Future of our Oceans

After more than twenty years of exploring the seas, marine biologist Helen Scales found herself struggling to answer a question that ever more people were asking: Are you hopeful for the future of the ocean? She's gazed into the intelligent eyes of octopuses, listened to whales singing under water and found pocket-sized sharks in rock pools; she has also swum in plastic-polluted waters and watched coral reefs bleaching in heat waves. With the growing public interest in nature combined with the rising tide of eco-anxiety, Scales is not alone in wrestling with feelings of anger and loss but also joy and wonder.

In What the Wild Sea Can Be, Scales finds a reassuring balance of hopes and fears for the future of the ocean. Instead of turning away from the problems, she encourages us to understand what's going on while still feeling a sense of awe and wonder in marine life and demanding a better future for the ocean which is still well within reach.



As a teenager, Gered took some of the best-loved photographs of the Stones and, in his new book *The Rolling Stones Rare and Unseen*, takes a look beyond those famous images to provide a truly fresh look at the greatest story in rock 'n' roll.


Where do ideas come from? Do you have ideas for a story? Come along to Anna's workshop and invent some bold characters and take them on an adventure!

### John Suchet In Search of Beethoven

John Suchet is one of the UK's best-loved news reporters and broadcasters and has been a mainstay on Classic FM since 2011.


In conversation with BBC Radio 3's Petroc Trelawny, John Suchet will be talking about *In Search of Beethoven*, his latest and most personal book on the great composer. Part biography, part memoir, part travelogue, Suchet draws on his own life and career to show how Beethoven's music has accompanied him through the best and worst of times. It was with him as a music-loving and adventurous teenager, as a journalist entering Beirut in the grip of civil war, and as he has continued to explore the old cities of Bonn and Vienna, in search of the man behind the music.

Suchet brings Beethoven vividly – and sometimes painfully – to life, taking us on a journey both literal and symbolic, as he uses his own experience as a Beethoven aficionado to demonstrate the life-changing power of great music.

## Rowan Williams Passions of the Soul

Rowan Williams was the 104th Archbishop of Canterbury, a position he held from 2002 until 2012, and was until 2020 Master of Magdalene College at the University of Cambridge.


As a poet and theologian, he has written over 20 books on subjects as diverse as W.H. Auden, Dostoevsky, C.S. Lewis's Narnia books, and the consolations of poetry. His latest, *Passions of the Soul*, looks at how the Eastern Christian tradition teaches us how to develop our self-knowledge and awareness and helps us to understand and cope with the ups and downs of modern life.

With compelling and illuminating insight, he will draw on a lifetime of learning to provide some well needed theological and philosophical nourishment.
